3. **Variation is Key:** Natural stone has unique patterns, and quality stone-look tiles replicate this by including subtle differences between tiles. Ask to see multiple boxes at the tile shop to understand the range of patterns.



Installation Tips for a Seamless Look

One thing many people don't realize is that installing stone-look tiles is easier than working with natural stone. You won't need special sealers or worry about porosity. However, proper installation is still crucial for achieving an authentic look.

I recently watched a master tiler install these tiles in a bathroom. His advice? Randomize the patterns. "The quickest way to spot fake stone," he said, "is when you see the same pattern repeated too closely."
