A Deautiful fair Diamonuback Teffapili Turticaa

The diamondback terrapin (Malaclemys terrapin) inhabits the coastal brackish and saltwater marshes of the eastern and southeastern U.S. It is amedium-sized turtle, with males reachingabout 5 inches in carapace length and females significantly larger at 9 inches. Generally, thecarapace and skin coloration of a terrapin is gray to whitish, with varying patterns of black spotsand streaks. Some even have black "mustaches." Occasionally, yellow blotches are found on thecarapace scutes, and an orange tinge may be present on the marginal scutes of some individuals.
