Although they differ from country to country, the traditional African village huts have thatched roofssupported by a wooden or an earth base. Some huts also have entirely thatched exteriors and an interiormade of mud. Due to the use of readily available local materials, this type ofhouse is classified asvernacular architecture. Although the choice of local materials is generally associated with poverty, it alsohas climatic advantages as it enables ventilation.

Here are some examples of traditional African village huts.

Zulu Huts in South Africa

In order to build a Zulu hut, it was first necessary to first create a frame by bending woodenpoles inwardtoward the center. Then, the frame is covered by weaving a thatch of dried grassesand eventually creating a dome-shaped structure.
