Ascend its 509 steps and be rewarded with a spectacular vista of Cologne, a staggering 157 meters above the city center. Meanwhile, Antonio Gaudi's masterpiece, the Sagrada Familia Cathedral in Barcelona, remains a perpetual work in progress, set to be completed around 2020. This architectural gem is an extraordinary blend of nature-inspired elements and innovative design.

Le Corbusier's Ronchamp is another architectural gem, an avant-garde chapel that marries modernist principles with spiritual resonance. Its curvilinear form and ethereal light play create a truly transcendent experience. Finally, the Matisse Chapel, also known as the Rosary Chapel, graces Vence, France. Designed by the renowned artist Henri Matisse, it embodies a unique fusion of art, spirituality, and architectural brilliance, offering a serene haven for contemplation.
