- 3. Saint David (Wales):
  - Reason: Saint David, also known asDewi Sant, is the patron saint of Wales.He was a Welsh bishop who foundedseveral monastic settlements in Walesduring the 6th century. Saint David's Dayis celebrated on March 1st, which isbelieved to be the date of his death.
- 4. Saint Patrick (Ireland):
  - Reason: Saint Patrick is the patron saintof Ireland. He is credited with bringing Christianity to Ireland and is celebratedon Saint Patrick's Day, which falls onMarch 17th. Legend has it that he usedthe three-leafed shamrock to explain theconcept of the Holy Trinity, whichbecame an iconic symbol of Ireland.

These patron saints hold significant cultural andreligious importance in their respective countries. They are revered for their contributions to Christianity and for their roles in the history andidentity of Britain and Ireland.
