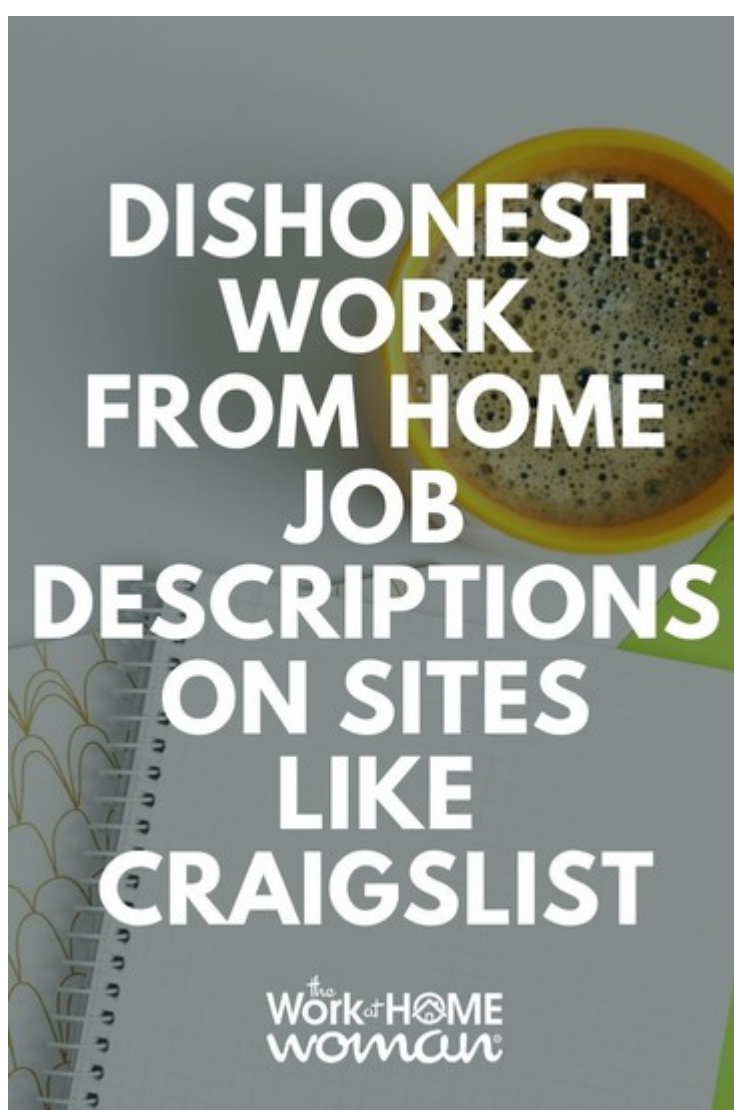


Dishonest Work-From-Home Job Descriptions on Sites Like Craigslist
