- Water-resistant and long-lasting, plywood (BWR/BWP) is a frequent material for cabinets in high-end kitchens.
- Medium-density fibreboard, or MDF, is less resilient in damp environments but is more reasonably priced.
- Although particleboard is inexpensive, it is not appropriate for areas with high moisture content.
- Laminate shutter finishes come in matte, glossy, and textured varieties and are reasonably priced and long-lasting.
- Acrylic is more expensive than laminates but offers a high-gloss, upscale appearance.
- Polyurethane, or PU, is expensive but elegant and resistant to scratches.
- Glass and lacquered glass are costly and aesthetically pleasing options.

Materials for Countertops

A critical component of both functionality and style is the kitchen countertop. The type of material chosen affects pricing:

- Granite is affordable, long-lasting, and heat-resistant.
- Quartz is more costly yet non-porous and stain-resistant. It comes in a variety of colours.
