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Sales tax is the tax imposed by the government onpurchased goods and services. In Canada, the amount ofsales tax varies between provinces, as they each calculatethis tax differently.

Some provinces combine the federal <u>Goods and Services Tax</u> (GST) and ProvincialSales Tax (PST), while othersbase their calculation solely on the Harmonized Sales Tax(HST).

The provinces and territories with the lowest sales tax rates in Canada include Yukon, the Northwest Territories, and Alberta. All of these regions have a total tax rate of only 5%, as they only charge GST and not PST.
