What Is An Affiliate Program?

An affiliate program allows you to earn money from sending traffic to certain companies. It happens when you promote their services or products on your blog.

It goes like this:

- Insert a trackable link into your content, for example, [Booking.com](#).
- Someone books a room through the link you provided.
- You get a commission from there.

In the quest of affiliate marketing, you'll come across the word 'cookie'. Besides not being edible, this cookie means a value stored on our computer. When someone visits your website through an affiliate link, the cookie is stored on their computer.

Cookies are used to track affiliate referrals and they have an expiry date. Let's say you're an affiliate partner of Klook and their affiliate cookie lasts for 24 hours. This means you can only earn commission from sales that take place within 24 hours after your reader clicked
