The branch number identifies your financial institution's branch. It's a way to know which bank branch you are referring to.

The first thing would be to ask the teller at your bank branch. Next time you stopby your bank, take a moment to ask the teller.

Then you can write it down, so you have access to it later, or memorizing it mightbe even better.

Another way to find out your bank branch number is to look at one of yourchecks. Your bank branch number, also known as a fractional bank number, canbe located in several places on a check.

It could be beneath the check number, beneath the ABA number, or to its right, or to the above/right of the date on the check. With all this confusion, it's best tosimply ask your bank if you're not sure.

How Do I Find My Branch Number Without a Check?

It might be pretty easy to find what you need if you have some checks on hand.But what if you don't carry checks or are out of them?

How do you find the bank branch number then? The best way is to contact yourbank.

Ask them directly what the number is, instead of looking in a bunch of other places. They will have the information on hand, and this is the fastest way to find what you need if you don't have a check.

You can also look on your bank's website. They'll sometimes have a link to this information
