## Trudead Meets Trump at Mar-a-Lago Amid Moing Trade

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau traveled toFlorida on Friday for an unannounced dinnermeeting with President-elect Donald Trump at hisMar-a-Lago estate, as Trump's recent tariff threatsagainst Canadian imports sparked concerns.

The meeting came at the end of a tumultuous weekfor North American trade relations, with both Canadaand Mexico scrambling to address Trump'spromises of imposing steep tariffs. Experts havewarned that such measures could have significant repercussions for U.S. consumers as well as tradingpartners.

Trudeau was spotted leaving a hotel in West PalmBeach before heading to Mar-a-Lago, where hejoined the growing list of prominent figures meetingwith Trump ahead of his second term, set to begin inJanuary. His re-election has already shifted focusfrom the waning months of President Joe Biden'sadministration.

Flight trackers first noted a plane using the primeminister's callsign arriving in Florida, and a Canadian government source later confirmed theleaders were dining together.

Trump caused alarm earlier in the week byannouncing plans for tariffs of 25% on Mexican and Canadian imports and 10% on goods from China. He accused the countries of failing to curb drugtrafficking, particularly fentanyl, and undocumented migration into the United States.

Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum held a phonecall with Trump on Wednesday, but their accounts ofthe discussion diverged. Trump claimed Sheinbaumagreed to stop migration through Mexico to the U.S., effectively sealing the border, while Sheinbaumdescribed the conversation as centered on existing U.S.-supported anti-migration policies and dismissed the threat of a trade war.

Canada faces significant stakes in the escalatingtrade tensions, as over three-quarters of its exports—valued at \$423 billion last year—are destined for the United States. Nearly two million Canadian jobs are tied to this trade relationship.

Speaking earlier in the week, Trudeau dismissed the idea that Trump's tariff threats were merely a negotiating tactic, stating, "Donald Trump, when he makes statements like that, he plans on carrying them out. There's no question about it."

Upon returning to his hotel Friday evening, Trudeau declined to answer questions from reporters about the meeting. However, a Canadian government source indicated that Canada is exploring retaliatory tariffs in response to Trump's threats.

Trudeau was accompanied on the trip by Public Safety Minister Dominic LeBlanc, according to reports from Canadian broadcaster CBC.

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
